Today proved to be a challenging day of historic proportions for all.

At dusk, I drove a van from our 8th grade encampment at Midland School and motored along the last 7 miles of the 8th grade cycling route. The heroism displayed by our students along the final miles brought tears to my eyes.

First, I asked 2 girls if I could take their BOB bags (approximately 35 lbs.) into the sag wagon in an effort to reduce the weight they had to tow behind their bikes. They enthusiastically said "no!" They continued on in the dark with their pathway, a dirt road on the Sedgwick Reserve, illuminated by our rear sag vehicle.

Next, I encountered a new 8th grade boy riding along side of a teacher. The student had mechanical problems earlier in the day and was now entering his tenth hour on a bike seat. I stopped the van and asked both the teacher and the student if they would like to ride in the sag. The kid quickly indicated that he would like to finish the ride. The teacher vowed to stick with his charge. I positioned my van behind them and the truck's bright lights lit up the road home, the last 3 miles of an incredible journey.

It is a trip that keeps getting better and better, and this year's "From the Vision to the Source" again exceeded all expectations.

For three days and nights, ninth graders and their teachers island-hopped the beautiful northern Channel Islands on the ninety foot dive boat "Vision," which served as floating classroom, bunkhouse, and gourmet kitchen.

The trip was the culmination of more than three weeks of intense study and research of "everything island." Students learned about and gave presentations on a wide variety of topics such as marine biology, ancient Chumash culture, the Island Fox, resource management,

marine debris, oil exploration, and a host of other issues.

Days were busy, and as the trip progressed, the ninth graders became a unified crew, working together and growing closer. New friendships were formed as the well-known SBMS campus disappeared over the horizon and the new and unfamiliar campus of the islands appeared before us.

Students were in a new environment; each island, each sea cave, each kelp forest, and each sandy beach became a unique and beautiful classroom where hands-on learning took place.

Students performed fish counts under the canopy of the kelp forests and made decisions about the efficacy of the marine sanctuaries. They sifted for plastics and debris on the beaches of Santa Rosa Island

The Eighth Grade Retreat

Every year eighth graders at SBMS go on retreat to El Capitan Canyon's Ocean Mesa Campground. Here, between the mountains and the ocean, we hope to further build the relationships within the eighth grade and give each student the opportunity to quietly reflect on themselves and their lives.

In order to build relationships within our community, students participate in a couple of activities that foster communication, common experience, and recognition of our individuality and contributions within the group.

First, we do a "low-ropes" course in which students need to work together to solve complex problems. Next, students participate in our Ceremony of Candles in which peers celebrate the individuality of

each person in the group. The symbolism as we light each student's candle is that one candle gives off only a bit of light, but fifty candles together are far more powerful.

The next morning, students wake before sunrise for their three-hour 'solo.' It is here where students are asked to imagine the life they dream of living. Using

Paolo Koehlo's 'personal legend' as an archetype, students are asked to ponder important questions at this formative time in their lives: What kind of adult would they like to be? What may be their life's work? Where would they like to go, and what would they like to experience? What do they value? What do they want people say about them when they're gone?

The retreat always proves to be an invigorating and inspirational event, and I'm looking forward to this year's retreat in December!

out with our 6th, 7th, and 9th grade students.

Many of these kids had spent more than 8 hours pedaling bikes and were shaping their final course home – just a few more exhausting miles. Our younger students, guided by their devoted 9th grade mentors, had persevered a long bike ride across the valley before climbing up and over Drum Canyon, a mountain on which many pro cyclists train.

From there, our kids rode across the flats to highway 246 before continuing on to our camp on Santa Rosa Road. Nighttime approaches to camp are not uncommon on some days of the Hero's/Heroine's Journey.

These will be the moments that students remember for decades. For some reason, our kids quickly forget about what happened on the easy days. Rather, the most challenging trip events burn indelible images in their memories. It is in this delicate space where kids learn about the value of persistence, stamina, attitude, and teamwork. I am so proud of our teachers and students. It is as simple as that.
